

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING
OF THE
TOWN OF OGUNQUIT

TO: **ANDREW D. THERIAULT, Chief of Police in the Town of Ogunquit, County of York and State of Maine:**

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Ogunquit, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet in the Dunaway Community Center in said Town on Saturday, the seventh day of April, 2001 A.D. at eight o'clock in the morning until eight o'clock in the evening to vote by secret ballot on **Articles 1 through 4** and to notify and warn said voters to meet in the same place in said Town on Monday, the ninth day of April, 2001 A.D. at seven o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on **Articles 5 through 66.**

ARTICLE 1: To elect a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.

ARTICLE 2: To elect the following Officers for the terms so noted or until such time as a successor is elected and qualified:

- A. **Three (3) Selectmen:** Each for a **two (2) year** term to commence at the conclusion of the second portion of the Annual Town Meeting; term ending April Town Meeting, 2003;
- B. **One (1) Member** to the Wells-Ogunquit Community School District for a **three (3) year** term to commence July 1, 2001; term ending June 30, 2004;

REFERENDUM QUESTION 1

ARTICLE 3: Shall an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to Amend Title X of the Ogunquit Municipal Code (Zoning Ordinance) to Clarify Article 8.14 as it relates to "Waste-Water Pollution" be enacted?

ARTICLE 15: Shall the Town vote to transfer the sum of \$18,713.07 from the 1999 Capital Improvement Account into Undesignated Fund Balance? (These monies represent the unexpended portions of several completed 1999 Capital Improvement projects.

ARTICLE 16: Shall the Town vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$650,000 to fund the local share of the reconstruction of the Beach Street Bridge and to fund said appropriation, authorize the Treasurer and Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to issue general obligation securities of the Town of Ogunquit, Maine (including temporary notes in anticipation of the sale thereof) in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$650,000 and the discretion to fix the date(s), maturity(ies), interest rate(s), call(s) for redemption, place(s) of payment, form, and other details of said securities, including execution and delivery of said securities on behalf of the Town of Ogunquit, and to provide for the sale thereof, is hereby delegated to the Treasurer and Chairman of the Board of Selectmen.



AND

Further, shall the Town vote to authorize the Municipal Officers and the Municipal Treasurer to execute and deliver quit-claim deeds, without covenant, for the conveyance of title for such property?

AND

Further, shall the Town vote to authorize the Municipal Officers to execute and deliver quit-claim deeds for the purpose of removing from the public records those tax liens which had inadvertently not been discharged in a timely manner?

The Board of Selectmen hereby gives Notice that the polls shall be open for voting purposes at eight o'clock in the morning or as soon as possible thereafter on the date of said Meeting and that polls will not be closed earlier than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day.



8.14 WASTE-WATER POLLUTION

- A. The disposal of waste water by means other than a public system must comply with the laws of the State of Maine and the Town concerning water pollution. Where a public sanitary sewer system is located within ~~150~~ 100 feet, horizontal distance, of any portion of the property line any new buildings used for human habitation or occupancy as measured along from the public way, the Town shall require participation in said sewer. Wherever the requirements of this Ordinance are at variance with the rules and regulations of the Sewer District, the most restrictive shall govern. In any case, entrance into the public sewers is mandatory if any portion of the building or lot is within 150 feet of the public sewer line. Buildings existing as of April 10, 2001 within 100 feet of a public sanitary sewer system which are served by a private sewer or drainage system shall not be required to connect to the sewer or drain of the Sewer District so long as the private sewer or drainage system functions in a satisfactory and sanitary manner and does not violate any law or ordinance applicable thereto or any applicable requirement of the State of Maine Plumbing Code as determined by the Ogunquit Licensed Plumbing Inspector. In the event of a failure of any private sewer or drainage system within 100 feet of a public waste water system as determined by the Code Enforcement Officer, such private system shall be replaced with a connection to the public sewer system. The effective date of this amended Article 8.14 is April 10, 2001.

TITLE IV - PUBLIC RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION ORDINANCE

Chapter 6 Shellfish management Ordinance (Enacted every 3 Years)

601 Authority

This Ordinance is enacted in accordance with 12
M.R.S.A. Sections 6671 and 6681.

602 Purpose

To establish a Shellfish Conservation Program for the
Town of Ugunquit which will insure the protection and
optimum utilization of shellfish resources within its
geographical limits. These goals will be achieved by
means which may include:

- A. Licensing of shellfish harvesters (diggers);
- B. Limiting the number of shellfish harvesters;
- C. Restricting the time and area which harvesting
is permitted;
- D. Limiting the minimum size of clams taken; and
- E. Limiting the amount of clams taken daily by a
harvester.

603 Shellfish Conservation Commission

The Shellfish Conservation Program for the Town of
Ugunquit will be administered by the Shellfish Conser-
vation Commission consisting of five (5) regular and
two (2) alternate members to be appointed by the
Selectmen for terms of three (3) years. The
Commission's responsibilities include:

- A. Establishing annually, in conjunction with the
Department of Marine Resources of the State of
Maine, the number of shellfish digging
licenses to be issued;
- B. Surveying the clam flats to maintain current
information on shellfish resources. Such
surveys include:
 - a) Determination of size frequency of the
shellfish,
 - b) Determination of growth,
 - c) Estimation of the standing crop of
shellfish,
 - d) Collection of harvest data documenting

- local values of shellfish resources,
 - e) Estimation of potential yield of the flats,
 - f) Identification of sources of pollution impacting shellfish populations and location of sources on charts,
 - g) Identification of other resource problems such as green crab predation on shellfish and competition from mussels,
 - h) Reseeding and transplanting to make fallow areas productive, and
 - i) Placing barriers to keep spat in the area.
- C. Submitting to the Board of Selectmen proposals for the expenditures of funds for the purpose of shellfish conservation;
- D. Reviewing this Ordinance periodically and make recommendations for amendments on a timely basis;
- E. Securing and maintaining records of shellfish harvest from the Municipality's managed shellfish areas (and closed areas that are conditionally opened by the Department of Marine Resources);
- F. Recommending conservation closures and openings to the Board of Selectmen in conjunction with the Area Biologist of the Department of Marine Resources;
- G. Designing and promulgating a Shellfish Conservation Plan in cooperation with the Department of Marine Resources based on the results of the clam flat survey, incorporating recommended levels of harvesting on the various flats (as shall be delineated on maps prepared by the Conservation Commission). Possible inclusions in such a plan are crop rotation, seed programs and predator control.
- H. Submitting an Annual Report to the Municipality and Department of Marine Resources detailing: all funds available, fund expenditures, harvest data, results of all experimental and conservation programs, enforcement activities and sources of pollution.

604 Definitions

604.1 **Municipality** means the Town of Ogunquit, Maine.

604.2 **Resident** means a person who has resided in the State of Maine for at least six (6) months next prior to the time his claims of such residence is made, and who has resided in this municipality for at least three (3) months prior to the time his claims of such residence is made. "Resident" is extended to include non-resident property tax paying owners of real estate in this municipality.

604.3 **Non-Resident** means anyone not qualified as a resident under this Ordinance.

604.4 **Shellfish/Clams** means softshell clams ("Mya Arenaria").

604.5 **Harvest** means to dig, take, remove or otherwise harvest shellfish in the municipality.

604.6 **Lot** means the total number of clams in any bulk pile. Where clams are in a box, barrel or other container, the contents of each box, barrel or other container constitutes a separate lot.

604.7 **Possess** means harvest, ship, transport, hold, buy and sell retail and wholesale clam shellstock.

604.8 **Period of Issuance** means the first ninety (90) days during which this municipality issues shellfish digging licenses each year.

605 Licensing

Municipal Shellfish Digging License is required. It is unlawful for any person to harvest shellfish in this Municipality without having a current license issued by this Municipality as provided by this Ordinance. It shall be lawful to harvest clams during the dates stated on the license. Actual digging is limited to daylight hours. It will be unlawful to dig from sunset to one-half hour before sunrise.

Licensee must be at least ten (10) years of age.

605.a **Type of License**

605.a.1 **Resident and Real Property Taxpayer Recreational Shellfish License**

This license is available to residents and real property taxpayers only of this municipality and entitles the holder to harvest no more than one (1) peck of shellfish in any one (1) day for the use of himself and his family, from the shore, flats or coastal waters of this municipality, when and where it is lawful to do so.

605.a.2 **Non-Resident, Recreational Shellfish License**

This license is available to any person not a resident of this Municipality and entitles the holder to harvest not more than one (1) peck of shellfish in any one (1) day for the use of himself and his family, from the shores, flats or coastal waters of this municipality, when and where it is lawful to do so.

605.a.3 **Resident, Commercial Shellfish License - No license available.**

605.a.4 **Non-Resident, Commercial Shellfish License - No license available.**

605.a.5 **One-Time, Specific Date License - Will be available to anyone, any state within the five (5) working days prior to the selected dig date.**

605.a.6 **Ogunquit Shellfish Conservation Commission - Reserved Licenses - These licenses shall be issued to each member serving on the Commission less than one (1) year upon payment of stated fees. Those Commission members having served more than one (1) year and accumulating ten (10) or more hours of service time doing clam surveys, testings or anything that benefits the Commission during the previous year shall be entitled to a free license.**

605.a.7 **License Must Be Signed**

The licensee must sign his or her license in order to validate it. Any person harvesting clams in this municipality shall have on his/her person and show to any Warden or Law Enforcement Officer positive identification, when requested, in addition to the license, where required.

605. b **Application Procedure**

Any person may apply to the Town Clerk for the license required by this Ordinance on forms provided by the municipality.

605. b. 1 **Contents of the Application**

The application must be in the form on an affidavit and must contain the applicant's name, current address, birth date, height, weight, signature and other information the Municipality may require.

605. b. 2 **Misrepresentation**

Any person who gives false information on a license application will cause said license to become invalid and void.

605. b. 3 **Records**

The Clerk or designated officials of this municipality shall note on the application the date the license was issued, sign it and file the application with his or her records.

605. b. 4 **Notice**

Notice of the number and the procedure for application shall be published in a trade or industry publication which the Municipal Officers consider effective in reaching persons affected; not less than ten (10) days prior to the period of issuance and shall be posted in the Municipal Offices until the period concludes.

605. c **Limitation of Diggers**

Because the shellfish resources are limited and because a commercial or recreational digger can be expected to harvest a certain volume of clams per year, the number of licenses must be controlled. The number will vary from year to year depending upon estimates of the resource capabilities and management requirements consistent with good resource utilization. The following procedures will be followed to exercise the control:

1. Prior to October 1 of each year, the Shellfish Conservation Commission with the approval of the Commissioner of Marine Resources, will establish the number of licenses to be permitted.

2. The Shellfish Conservation Commission will notify the Town Clerk, in writing, prior to October 1 of each year the number of licenses to be issued.
3. During the period of issuance, the Town Clerk shall issue licenses to residents and nonresidents as allocated for each year on or after November 1 until January 29, after which the then remaining unsold licenses shall be issued on a first-come, first-served basis to residents and non-residents alike.

605.d **License Expiration Date**

Each license issued under authority of this Ordinance expires at midnight on the 31st day of March.

606 **Minimum Legal Size of Shellfish**

It is unlawful to possess in this Municipality shellfish which are less than two inches (2") in the longest diameter except that a licensee may possess shellfish that are less than two inches (2") if they comprise less than ten percent (10%) of any lot. The tolerance shall be determined by numerical count of not less than one (1) peck nor more than four (4) pecks taken at random from various parts of the lot or by a count of the entire lot if it contains less than one (1) peck.

- 606.a Digger must use "clam digger's fork", or a tined fork with two inch (2") separation of tines and with a handle no longer than two feet (2').

607 **Opening and Closing of Flats**

The Municipal Officers, with the approval of the Commissioner of Marine Resources, may open and close areas for shellfish harvest. Upon recommendation of the Shellfish Conservation Commission and concurrence of the Department of Marine Resources Area Biologist that the status of the shellfish resource and other factors bearing on sound management indicate that an area should be opened or closed, the Municipal Officers may call a public hearing on ten (10) days notice published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality stating the time, place and subject matter of the hearing, and shall send a copy of the notice to the Department of Marine Resources. The decision of the Municipal Officers made after the hearing shall be based on findings of fact.

Chapter 1 Title, Purpose and Definitions

104 Definitions

AS used in this Ordinance, the words listed below shall have the following definitions:

- 104.1 At large: Off the premises of the owner, unless controlled by a leash, cord, chain, or unless within a vehicle, or under restraint in an open vehicle being driven or parked in any public area. ~~This definition shall apply from May 15 to October 1 and from October 1 to May 15 on the Marginal Way (4/8/01-APM).~~

ARTICLE 8

Chapter 2 General Ordinances

202 Running at Large

The owner of any pet or other animal shall not permit that pet or animal to run at large, except when used for hunting; or upon private property except with the consent of the owner. Dogs or other animals shall not be allowed to run at large on any public beach in Town except in the designated area from the Footbridge Beach walkway to the Moody Beach Town Line on the ocean side between October 1 and ~~May 15~~ March 31. The first offense of this Section shall merit a warning from an officer of the Town. A second offense, once determined by the Town,

ARTICLE 9

206.1 Ogunquit Beach

- 206.1.1 Dogs are permitted within the Ogunquit Beach area from October 1 to ~~May 15~~ March 31, if on a leash, cord or chain. Dogs may be at large as noted in Section 202. ARTICLE 11

7.2 LAND USE CONTROLS

7.2.B. All new lots, new structures and additions to structures shall meet the minimum dimensional requirements for the district in which they are located as detailed in Table 703.1. If more than one principal building is located on a lot, the buildings shall be separated by a distance equal to twice the minimum side setback for the district in which they are located. On lots owned by a condominium association with a number of principal buildings including but not limited to single-family dwellings, setbacks between the principal buildings must be at least twice the minimum side setback of the district. Except, clustered or planned unit developments that meet all the applicable requirements of Article 9.6 may deviate from the requirements of Article 7.2.B.

ARTICLE 12

Article 3.5. NONCONFORMING HOTELS AND MOTELS

With the rapid expansion of transient housing in recent years, hotels and motels now take up a disproportionate share of the Town's land area. To promote the health, safety and welfare of Ogunquit citizens, to comply with the last adopted Comprehensive Plan, to mitigate parking, traffic and congestion problems, and to preserve a community quality, hotels and motels are no longer permitted uses except in the General Business District-2 (GBD2). Any hotel or motel legally existing at the time of the adoption of this Ordinance which does not conform to the use requirements of this Ordinance or its amendments may continue and shall be permitted to expand, be reconstructed or be structurally altered within the owner's lot of record or contiguous lots of record as of the date of adoption of this Ordinance. ~~With respect to legal non-conforming hotels and motels, whenever this section (Article 3.5) conflicts with any other provisions of Article 3, Article 9, or any other provisions of this Ordinance, Article 3.5 shall prevail.~~ The expansion, reconstruction or structural alteration of nonconforming hotels or motels in non-GBD2 Zones must conform to all standards for permitted uses in the General Business District-2 (GBD2), ~~and~~ to the General Performance Standards of Article 8 of this Ordinance and to Article 9.8.E (but not to the other Standards of Article 9.8). The plans for any such expansion, reconstruction or alteration of any nonconforming hotels or motels in non-GBD2 Zones must be reviewed by the Planning Board for conformance with these standards. The Planning Board shall approve, deny or approve with conditions.

Rationale: The proposed amendment would bring Article 3.5 into line with the Town Attorney's interpretation and the Planning Board's intention that existing hotels and motels outside of the GBD2 Zone can be expanded on their lot of record in conformance to the dimensional standards of the GBD2 Zone. Only new hotel or motel construction within the GBD2 Zone itself must meet the standards of Article 9.8.


