Dear Ogunquit Voter:

The Annual Town Meeting takes place on Tuesday, June 11th at the Dunaway Community Center. We hope you will take the time to vote. This informational packet is intended to assist you. It contains each Article as it will appear on the ballot, plus a brief explanation of each Article. We encourage every voter to review this information to help you make informed decisions.

Zoning Ordinance Amendments. This year there are 2 zoning ordinance amendments on the ballot. Article 5 pertains to a zoning amendment which was requested by the Ogunquit Playhouse. Article 6 amends the zoning ordinance regarding Restaurant Definitions. Copies of the proposed zoning Ordinance Amendments are on the Town web site, and are available at the Town Office. Please feel free to contact the Land Use Office staff if you have questions or would like more information.

Budget. The Budget Articles are listed by each individual department or program. Each Article contains the funding amounts recommended by the Select Board and the Budget Review Committee. We reviewed and evaluated each budget and each capital project. We take our responsibilities seriously to represent the citizens and recommend a budget that reflects the interests of the taxpayers and allows the Town to accomplish community priorities. Ultimately, it is up to the voters to make the final decision regarding funding choices for the community.

Although each budget Article is listed separately, as you review them it is important to look at them as a whole. The budget is a Work Plan for the Town. The proposed budget funds municipal services and programs for the coming year. The budget approved last year allowed us to start addressing much needed, overdue work to help our community thrive. The FY20 budget continues that work with a particular focus on these priority areas: Public Safety, including increased coverage by the firefighters to address increased call volume, enhanced quality control in delivering Emergency Medical Services, and Lifeguard/Ocean Rescue services; technology to allow employees to perform their work more efficiently; maintenance of public spaces and infrastructure; capital planning and fiscal management; and people. Ultimately, the reason we exist as a Town is to serve the people of our community, ensure their safety and well-being, and deliver essential public services efficiently and cost effectively.

As you review each of the Articles, if you have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact any of us or feel free to contact the Town Manager townmanager@townofogunquit.org.

In closing we want to thank the Town employees for all their efforts throughout the year. We are fortunate to have such a dedicated group of people working on our behalf. We also want to thank the many citizens who volunteer to serve on Town Committees. Our community is a better place thanks to your generous sharing of your time and talents. If you are interested in volunteering, please go to the web site and complete a volunteer application form.

We hope this background information is helpful to you. Whether you participate in the Town Meeting in person or by Absentee Ballot, we hope you'll take the time to vote and help determine the direction of our community's future.

Article 1: To elect a Moderator to preside at said Meeting. [**Note:** *This question is voted on by people present at the time the polls open on June 11 at the Town Meeting. It is not part of the official secret ballot.*]

Article 2: To elect **One (1) Select Board Member** for a three (3) year term to commence at the conclusion of the 2019 Annual Town Meeting; term ending at the Annual Town Meeting in 2022.

Article 3: To elect **One (1) Budget Review Committee Member** for a three (3) year term to commence at the conclusion of the 2019 Annual Town Meeting; term ending Annual Town Meeting 2022.

Article 4: To elect **One (1) Wells-Ogunquit Community School District Trustee** for a three (3) year term to commence July 1, 2019; term ending June 30, 2022.

Article 5: Shall an ordinance entitled “**An Ordinance to Amend the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance to Create the “Shoreland General Development 3 – Ogunquit Playhouse – SG3 District and to Amend the Official Zoning Map to include within that District Lots 5-42, 5-43 and 5-44 as shown on the Ogunquit Tax Maps”** be enacted? [*Note: Copies of the proposed Ordinance is available in the Town Clerk’s Office.*]

Article 5 Summary: *The proposed Zoning amendment would rezone the Ogunquit Playhouse properties on Main Street from the Shoreland Limited Commercial (SLC) District to the Shoreland General Development (SG3) District. This change will allow the Ogunquit Playhouse to make improvements to its facilities, including bathrooms, ADA access, increase the maximum building height to build a “fly tower,” and increase the allowed lot coverage. If this zoning ordinance is approved, the Ogunquit Playhouse will be required to bring any development plans to the Planning Board for review and approval.*

Article 6: Shall an ordinance entitled “**Amendment to Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance Restaurant Definitions and Table 702.1.**” be enacted?

[**Note:** Copies of the proposed ordinance amendment are available in the Town Clerk's Office.]

Article 6 Summary: Currently the zoning ordinance contains definitions for 6 types of restaurants. This amendment reduces the total number of restaurant definitions from 6 to 4. Other regulating language, such as Formula Restaurant restrictions will be relocated to Article 8 - Standards for Specific Land Uses. Currently restaurants which serve food at a "take out" window or counter are not permitted in Perkins Cove. This amendment would allow that use with Planning Board approval.

FY 2019-2020 BUDGET ARTICLES

Article 7 through Article 31 pertains to the proposed FY 2019-2020 operating budget expenditures. The Town's fiscal year starts July 1, 2019 and ends June 30, 2020. Voters are asked to vote on each department or program budget. Each Article shows the recommendation by the Select Board and the Budget Review Committee. If voters do not approve the amount recommended by either the Select Board or the Budget Review Committee, the amount approved is the amount approved in the prior year's budget. (See Town Charter: Article V Financial Procedures, Section 503.6)

Article 7: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$859,039** for **General Government** expenditures for fiscal year **2019-2020**? [**Note:** If this article is defeated, the appropriation for General Government will default to \$848,066 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]

Select Board recommends: Yes 5-0
Budget Review Committee recommends: Yes 5-0

Article 7 Summary: This budget funds the Select Board, Town Manager, Town Clerk, the Treasurer, Tax Office, and local and state elections.

Article 8: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$28,419** for **Ogunquit Heritage Museum** expenditures for fiscal year **2019-2020**? [**Note:** If this article is defeated, the appropriation for the Ogunquit Heritage Museum will default to \$26,397 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]

Select Board recommends: Yes 5-0
Budget Review Committee recommends: Yes 5-0

Article 8 Summary: This budget funds the operating costs of the Ogunquit Heritage Museum located on Obeds Lane adjacent to the Dorothea Jacobs Grant Common.

Article 9: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$1,500** for **Bicycle-Pedestrian Committee** expenditures for fiscal year **2019-2020**? *[Note: If this article is defeated, the appropriation for the Bicycle-Pedestrian Committee will default to \$1,500 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]*

Select Board recommends: Yes 5-0
Budget Review Committee recommends: Yes 5-0

Article 9 Summary: *This budget funds the activities of the Town’s Bicycle-Pedestrian Committee including community education and bike safety events, bike check-ups, and advocating for safe streets and sidewalks for pedestrians.*

Article 10: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$17,300** for **Parks & Recreation Committee** expenditures for fiscal year **2019-2020**? *[Note: If this article is defeated, the appropriation for the Parks & Recreation Committee will default to \$17,300 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]*

Select Board recommends: Yes 5-0
Budget Review Committee recommends: Yes 5-0

Article 10 Summary: *This budget funds the activities of the Parks & Recreation Committee including Music in the Park, the “Bonaire” festival, the Sand Castle Contest, movie nights, and Christmas by the Sea. It also includes funds to improve the Agamenticus Park ballfield.*

Article 11: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$9,500** for **Ogunquit Performing Arts** for fiscal year **2019-2020**? *[Note: If this article is defeated, the appropriation for the Ogunquit Performing Arts will default to \$6,500 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]*

Select Board recommends: Yes 5-0
Budget Review Committee recommends: Yes 4-1

Article 11 Summary: *These funds help support Ogunquit Performing Arts which presents performances and cultural events throughout the year including the annual Capriccio Festival, the Piano Festival, Chamber Music Festival, movies at the Dunaway Center, dance performances, and other cultural activities. The increased funding will be used for marketing to promote OPA’s events to increase audience attendance and revenues. OPA raises more than \$17,000 in ticket sales and fundraising. In addition OPA received in-kind contributions of goods and services valued at \$23,000 last year.*

Article 12: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$373,294** for **Land Use Department** expenditures for fiscal year **2019-2020**? *[Note: If this article is defeated, the appropriation for the Land Use Department will default to \$360,973 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]*

Select Board recommends: Yes 5-0
Budget Review Committee recommends: Yes 5-0

Article 12 Summary: *This budget funds the operations of the Land Use, Code Enforcement, Planning, and Assessing office. The primary reason for the increase is to fund the Assessing Office’s annual review of properties to keep assessed values current.*

Article 13: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$313,094** for **Visitors Services** expenditures for fiscal year **2019-2020**? *[Note: If this article is defeated, the appropriation for Visitor Services will default to \$302,269 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]*

Select Board recommends: Yes 5-0
Budget Review Committee recommends: Yes 5-0

Article 13 Summary: *These funds are for the operations of the municipal parking lots, the parking permit program, and the Visitor Services employees who staff the parking lots and collect parking fees. The staff collects the parking revenues and serves as ambassadors for Ogunquit.*

Article 14: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$1,839,814** for **Police Department** expenditures for fiscal year **2019-2020**? *[Note: If this article is defeated, the appropriation for the Police Department will default to \$1,755,797 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]*

Select Board recommends: Yes 4-1
Budget Review Committee recommends: Yes 5-0

Article 14 Summary: *This budget funds the operations of the Police Department which provides year-round public safety services to the community. It also funds a School Resource Officer who is assigned to the public schools, during the school year and works as a patrol officer when school is not in session. The Wells-Ogunquit School District funds half of the cost of that position. The Department also has seasonal Community Service Officers during the summer to help with Beach patrol, traffic control, and parking enforcement.*

Article 18 Summary: *These funds are for the Public Works Department which is responsible for managing, maintaining, and preserving the Town’s network of streets, sidewalks, infrastructure, parking lots, beaches, and now parks. The Department has undergone significant change in the past 2 years in an effort to be more proactive in setting and achieving priorities. Projects are being engineered which allows us to have more accurate cost estimates, meet quality standards, and construct projects that will last. We also are developing long-term plans to properly maintain vehicles, equipment, and infrastructure.*

There are two reasons for the increase in the Public Works Budget: (1) the Parks employees have been transferred from the Facilities Department to the Public Works budget (see Article 23). Employees are being cross-trained so every employee can do multiple tasks which improves productivity and efficiency; and (2) we have added a contracted position that is responsible for securing federal and state funds. FEMA pays for a portion of the employee’s wages and the grant funds will reduce the amount needed to be collected in local property taxes. This position will work with the Public Works Director to secure FEMA funds to pay for damage caused by the March 2018 storms. For more information about the FEMA projects and funding, please visit the Town’s web site.

Bottom line: *We continue to restructure Public Works to increase our productivity and efficiency. When the Public Works (Article 18) and the Facilities (Article 23) operating budgets are taken together, the total increase is 2.8% more than last year. The FEMA grant writer/administrator’s salary increases the budget, but those costs will be offset by the federal and state funds.*

Article 50: Shall the Town vote to appropriate the sum of **\$150,000** from the **Undesignated Fund Balance** for **Marginal Way Improvements**? *[Note: If this article is defeated, the appropriation for Marginal Way Improvements will default to \$0 pursuant to Section 503.6 of the Town Charter]*

Article 50 Summary: *The Marginal Way had severe damage during the 3 nor'easter's in March 2018. The Town is eligible to receive federal funds to help pay for these repairs. These funds will pay the Town's share for these improvements. The Town will be eligible to receive Federal Emergency Management Act (FEMA) reimbursement funding (75% federal, 15% state and 10% town). In other words, for every \$1.00 the Town spends, we are reimbursed 90 cents.*

Revenues

Article 53 Summary: *These are the revenues collected at the Town's parking lots and beach parking permits. These revenues fund capital improvements, maintenance, and other costs.*

Article 54: Shall the Town vote to collect and appropriate the estimated amounts in **Town Generated Revenue** and **State Revenue** in the amount of **\$1,379,730** to reduce the amount to be raised by taxation?

\$1,379,730 Select Board recommends: Yes 5-0

Article 54 Summary: *This article is to approve the use of State and Town revenues collected to decrease amount of taxes levied. These funds include excise taxes, State-Municipal Revenues Sharing, building permits, and other fees.*

***Article 55 Summary:** This article accepts revenues received from the State of Maine which decreases the amount of property taxes that need to be levied.*

Article 56: Shall the Town vote to increase the property tax levy limit established for Ogunquit by State law in the event that the municipal budget approved for fiscal year **2019-2020** will result in a tax commitment that is greater than the property tax levy limit?

***Article 56 Summary:** This article is recommended in reference to LD 1 in case the need arises for increased funding, pursuant to Title 30-A M.R.S.A. §5721-A.*

Article 57: Shall the Town authorize the Select Board to apply for and accept grant funds, donations and gifts; and authorize the Select Board to spend such funds for the purposes intended as allowed by law?

***Article 57 Summary:** This annual warrant article is required by law, pursuant to Title 30-A M.R.S.A. §5652-5655.*

Article 58: Shall the Town vote to fix the date when property taxes shall be due and payable as follows:

- One-half (1/2) of the tax commitment shall be due 30 days after the commitment on or about **November 15, 2019**,
- The other one-half (1/2) of the tax commitment shall be due on or about **May 15, 2020**; and further,
- Interest at the rate of nine-percent (**9%**) per annum shall be charged for taxes not paid by the established due date(s).

***Article 58 Summary:** This warrant article is submitted annually as required by law. The interest rate being charged on delinquent taxes is set at 9% which is the maximum amount allowed (Title 36 M.R.S.A. §505.4).*

Article 59: Shall the Town vote to pay no more than five-percent (5%) per annum to taxpayers who pay taxes in excess of the amounts finally assessed, and to authorize such interest paid or abatements granted to be charged against the Town's annual overlay, or if necessary, against the Town's **Undesignated Fund Balance**?

Article 59 Summary: This article is submitted annually, pursuant to Title 36 M.R.S.A. §506-A

Article 60: Shall the Town vote to authorize the Select Board to make one of the following decisions for each **Tax Lien Acquired Property**?

1. To dispose of the property by allowing the immediate former owner, or the immediate former owner's estate, to buy back title to the property from the Town. Buy-back of the property shall require payment of all taxes due plus interest and lien costs; payment of all other costs, and satisfaction of all other conditions established by the Select Board.
2. To dispose of the property by conducting a limited public sale among the parties who own property that directly abuts this property, with a minimum price of all taxes due plus interest costs and lien costs; payment of all other costs and/or satisfaction of all other conditions established by the Select Board, which may include a lesser amount than the full taxes due when the Select Board deems such amount to be in the best interest of the Town.
3. To dispose of the property by public sealed bid auction or other public process, with a minimum price of all taxes due plus interest and lien costs; payment of all other costs and/or satisfaction of all other conditions established by the Select Board, which may include a lesser amount than the full taxes due when the Select Board deems such amount to be in the best interest of the Town.
4. To hold Town title to the property.

Article 60 Summary: This article pertains to the process the Town must follow if the Town acquires a property due to non-payment of taxes. The Town does not want to take property and works with property owners to keep them in their home. This article is submitted annually as required by law.

Article 61: Shall the Town authorize the Treasurer to waive foreclosure on any Tax Lien during the course of the fiscal year, leaving the Tax Lien Mortgage in full force and effect as provided for in 36 M.R.S.A. 944 (1), said waiver requiring the approval of the Select Board?

***Article 61 Summary:** This article is submitted annually as required by law. It allows the Treasurer to waive foreclosure of a property when authorized by the Select Board.*

Article 62: Shall the Town vote to authorize the Select Board to dispose of town-owned surplus property upon such terms and conditions as the Select Board may deem to be in the best interests of the Town as otherwise allowed by law?

***Article 62 Summary:** This article is submitted annually as required by law and allows the Select Board to sell town-owned property and equipment that is no longer needed*
