

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING

of the

TOWN OF OGUNQUIT

To WILLIAM P. HANCOCK, JR., Chief of Police in the Town of Ogunquit, County of York and State of Maine:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Ogunquit, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet in the Dunaway Community Center in said Town on Saturday, the second day of March, 1985 A.D. at nine o'clock in the morning, until one o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on Article 1 and 2; and to notify and warn said voters to meet in the same place in said Town on the same day at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on Article 3 through 78:

ARTICLE 1: To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2: To elect the following officers for the terms so noted or until such time as a successor is elected and qualified:

- A. Three (3) Selectmen: Each for a two (2) year term to commence on March 2, 1985. Term ending Annual Town Meeting, 1987.
- B. One (1) member to Wells-Ogunquit Community School District: Three (3) year term, with such terms so designated on the nomination papers.
- C. Four (4) members to Budget Committee: First and second highest vote recipients for terms ending Annual Meeting, 1987 and third and fourth highest vote recipients for terms ending Annual Meeting, 1986.
- D. One (1) Trustee to the Kennebunk, Kennebunkport, Wells Water District Board of Trustees: Term ending Annual Town Meeting, 1987.
- E. Nine (9) members to the Charter Commission: To revise the Charter for the Town of Ogunquit. Six (6) members to be elected by the voters and three (3) members to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen.
- F. One (1) Trustee to the Ogunquit Sewer District: Three (3) year term to commence June, 1985 to be elected at the Annual Town Meeting, March 2, 1985.

ARTICLE 3: Shall the Town vote to replace the present Zoning Ordinance definition of "Mobile Homes" with the following definition:

Manufactured Housing (Mobile Homes): Structural units or units designed for occupancy constructed in a manufacturing facility and then transported on its own or other chassis to a building site, or modular homes constructed in sections and then transported. All manufactured housing shall be at least 14 feet in width, shall contain at least 650 square feet of living space, shall have a pitched roof and siding within the Ogunquit Building Code. The structure shall be placed on a permanent foundation, slab or cellar within the Building Code. The length shall be parallel with the road.

ARTICLE 4: Shall the Town vote to replace the present Zoning Ordinance exclusion and allow mobile homes in the One-Family Residence District, Residence District, Rural Residence District 1, Rural Residence District 2, Perkins Cove Residence District and Perkins Cove Limited Business District.

ARTICLE 5: Shall the Town vote to delete the present definition of Awning on Page 10 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance and replace with the following:

"A temporary, retractable cover and frame that is attached to the exterior wall of a building. Awnings shall not be subject to set-back requirements."

ARTICLE 6: Shall the Town vote to add the definition of Deck to Page 12 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Deck: A flat-floored, roofless and wall-less area adjoining a structure. An awning-covered deck shall not be construed as a porch.

ARTICLE 7: Shall the Town vote to add the definition of Porch to Page 14 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Porch: A flat-floored, roofed area attached to the exterior of a building.

ARTICLE 8: Shall the Town vote to add the definition of Roof to Page 14 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Roof: A permanent protective overhead exterior cover of a structure. An awning shall not be construed as a roof.

ARTICLE 9: Shall the Town vote to amend the definitions of Yard Front, Yard Rear and Yard Side by deleting the phrase: "An open space on the same lot with the building," at the beginning of each definition?

ARTICLE 10: Shall the Town vote to amend Section III, Definitions of Height of Building on Page 12 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance to read:

"The height of a building is the vertical measurement from the structure's highest point to the arithmetic average of the original ground level on all four (4) sides. This height shall not include features of the building or structure such as chimneys, decorative cupolas, towers or spires, or similar non-habitable appurtenances?"

ARTICLE 11: Shall the Town vote to amend the first sentence of Section IV.D. Building Permit as follows:

The Code Enforcement Officer shall be consulted before any building or other structure is erected, demolished, moved or additions are made if the cost of such changes exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) of fair market value as determined by the Code Enforcement Officer. This includes work done both internally and externally. The Code Enforcement Officer will determine whether a building permit is required, as well as the fair market value, or whether the proposed alterations are routine maintenance?

ARTICLE 12: Shall the Town vote to add the following section to Page 21, Section IV Administration - Enforcement Officer:

H. Performance Bond - Construction of any residence, commercial or industrial building or other structure requires the posting of a Performance Bond in an amount to be specified by the Code Enforcement Officer. The Code Enforcement Officer's determination shall be based upon consultation with the Road Commissioner, Police Chief, Fire Chief, Town Manager and utility companies. The Performance Bond amount shall be based on an estimate of the potential responsibility and/or liability affecting town property and town services and those aspects of the development which are anticipated to be open to the public.

ARTICLE 13: Shall the Town vote to add the definition of Dwelling Unit Time-Shared after the definition of Dwelling Unit in Section III, Page 12, of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Dwelling Unit Time-Shared: A dwelling unit which is strongly analogous to that of hotels, motels, rooming houses and other dwellings in which there are frequent changes in occupants and is operated for profit.

ARTICLE 14: Shall the Town vote to permit "Dwelling Units Time-Shared" only in the General Business District, Limited Business District, and Perkins Cove Limited Business District?

ARTICLE 15: Shall the Town vote to add the following sentence to the definition of Dwelling Unit, on Page 12, Section III of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance?

"This definition shall be deemed to include efficiency units, studio units, and other similar units excluding trailers and recreational vehicles."

ARTICLE 16: Shall the Town vote to add the definition of "Patio" to Section III, Page 14 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Patio: "For the purpose of this Ordinance, a patio is a structure."

ARTICLE 17: Shall the Town vote to add the measurement "(10 ft. x 20 ft.)" to the current definition of Parking Space on Page 14 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance ?

ARTICLE 18: Shall the Town vote to replace the present definition of "Half-Story" on Page 12 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance with the following:

"Shall mean one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the habitable floor area of the floor beneath a pitched roof. The ridge line shall be along the center axis of the floors below; and fifty percent (50%) of the half-story shall be located on one side of the ridge line with the remaining fifty percent (50%) on the other side of the ridge line. The height of any knee wall adjacent to an eave shall not be more than four feet (4') in height."

ARTICLE 19: Shall the Town vote to delete Section IV-a-5-c, Page 68, (Clustered or Planned Unit Residential Development) "Water Supply" and replace with the following:

"c) Water Supply: The primary source of water shall be the public water district system.

ARTICLE 20: Shall the Town vote to add the following sentence to Chapter II, Section IV, Paragraph A-5-h, Page 68, (Clustered or Planned Unit Residential Development):

"h) Sewage Disposal: Sewage will be discharged only into the Ogunquit Sewer Distirct system."

ARTICLE 21: Shall the Town vote to eliminate the opening phrase: "When reasonably available," of Chapter II, Section V, Paragraph C-6, Page 74, (Clustered or Planned Unit Residential Development) ?

ARTICLE 22: Shall the Town vote to add the following statement as Chapter II, Section V, Paragraph c-7, Page 74, (Clustered or Planned Unit Residential Development)?

"7) A public sewer main of at least eight inches (8") in diameter must exist for the use of buildings, residents and occupants of the street to be accepted."

ARTICLE 23: Shall the Town vote to amend the first sentence of the second paragraph of Section II, c.3, Non-conforming Structures, Enlargements Controlled, on Page 6 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance to read:

"The addition of an open patio with no structures elevated above ground level shall constitute the expansion of a non-conforming structure."

ARTICLE 24: Shall the Town vote to substitute the present definition of Structure on Page 15 of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance and replace with the following:

Structure: Any object which requires location on the ground, which utilizes ground area, or which is attached to something having location to the ground.

ARTICLE 25: Shall the Town vote to amend Section VII, Residence District, D-3, Page 30 (Special Exceptions) to read as follows:

"Open space recreational uses exclusive of drive-in theaters or similar public intensive use facilities operated for profit."

ARTICLE 26: Shall the Town vote to standardize the wording "Public Utility Installation" in each of the zoning districts where "Public Utility, etc." appears under Special Exceptions, and add it to Special Exceptions in all districts where it has been omitted.?

ARTICLE 27: Shall the Town vote to amend Chapter 1, Section II, C.6, Page 7 (Non-conforming Structures - Lack of Required Parking or Loading Space) of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance to read as follows:

"A structure or use which is non-conforming as to the requirements for off-street parking space shall not be enlarged or altered unless off-street parking space is provided for the original structure or use sufficient to satisfy the requirements of this Ordinance and unless additional off-street parking space is provided for such enlargement or alteration of the original structure or use sufficient to satisfy the requirements of this Ordinance."

"A structure which is non-conforming as to the requirements for off-street loading space shall not be enlarged or altered unless off-street loading space is provided for the original structure or use sufficient to satisfy the requirements of this Ordinance and unless additional off-street loading space is provided for such enlargements or alteration of the original structure or use sufficient to satisfy the requirements of this Ordinance."

ARTICLE 28: Shall the Town vote to repeal Section 205.3 of Title IV of the Ogunquit Municipal Code (Hunting and Firearms) and to enact in its place the following:

"It shall be unlawful for any person, not being a guard or law enforcement official under the laws of the State of Maine, to discharge a firearm within the Town of Ogunquit with the following exceptions:

Hunting of wild animals and wild birds is permitted during the legal open hunting season, except that such hunting shall be limited to the use of a shotgun or long bow and arrow within that portion of Town east of the Maine Turnpike (US Route 95), north of the Josias River and south of the Ogunquit River; or at a target range, or in lawful self-defense, or while saluting with blank charges.

The use of air rifles, air pistols, pellet guns or BB guns, so-called, is prohibited within the Town of Ogunquit except in such places provided on private property or by some organization in the Town."

ARTICLE 29: Shall the Town vote to amend Section 602 of Title IX of the Ogunquit Municipal Code (Permit for Yard and Garage Sales) by replacing the words "Town Clerk" with the words "Code Enforcement Officer"?

ARTICLE 30: Shall the Town vote to repeal the Ogunquit Transit District?

ARTICLE 31: Shall the Town vote to adopt the following Ordinance for Shellfish Management and Harvesting:

1. **AUTHORITY:** This ordinance is enacted in accordance with 12 M.R.S.A. Sections 6671 and 6681.
2. **PURPOSE:** To establish a shellfish conservation program for the Town of Ogunquit which will insure the protection and optimum utilization of shellfish resources within its geographical limits. These goals will be achieved by means which may include:
 - A) Licensing of shellfish harvesters (diggers),
 - B) Limiting the number of shellfish harvesters,
 - C) Restricting the time and area which harvesting is permitted,
 - D) Limiting the minimum size of clams taken, and
 - E) Limiting the amount of clams taken daily by a harvester.

ARTICLE 31: (Continued)

3. SHELLFISH CONSERVATION COMMISSION: The Shellfish Conservation Program for the Town of Ogunquit will be administered by the Shellfish Conservation Commission consisting of five (5) regular and two (2) alternate members to be appointed by the Selectmen for terms of three (3) years.

The Commission's responsibilities include:

- A) Establishing annually, in conjunction with the Department of Marine Resources of the State of Maine, the number of shellfish digging licenses to be issued:
 - B) Surveying the clam flats to maintain current information on shellfish resources. Such surveys include:
 - a. Determination of size frequency of the shellfish,
 - b. Determination of growth,
 - c. Estimation of the standing crop of shellfish,
 - d. Collection of harvest data documenting local values of shellfish resources,
 - e. Estimation of potential yield of the flats,
 - f. Identification of sources of pollution adjacent to shellfish populations and location of discharges on charts, and
 - g. Identification of other resource problems such as green crab predation on shellfish and competition from mussels.
 - C) Submitting to the Board of Selectmen proposals for the expenditures of funds for the purpose of shellfish conservation:
 - D) Reviewing this ordinance periodically and making recommendations for amendments on a timely basis;
 - E) Securing and maintaining records of shellfish harvest from the Municipality's managed shellfish areas (and closed areas that are conditionally opened by the Department of Marine Resources);
 - F) Recommending conservation closures and openings to the Board of Selectmen in conjunction with the Area Biologist of the Department of Marine Resources;
 - G) Designing and promulgating a shellfish conservation plan in cooperation with the Department of Marine Resources based on the results of the clam flat survey, incorporating recommended levels of harvesting on the various flats (as shall be delineated on maps prepared by the Conservation Commission). Possible inclusions in such a plan are crop rotation, seed programs and predator control.
 - H) Submitting an annual report to the Municipality and the Department of Marine Resources detailing: all funds available, fund expenditures, harvest data, results of all experimental and conservation programs, enforcement activities and sources of pollution.
4. DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED IN THIS ORDINANCE:
- A. MUNICIPALITY: Municipality means the Town of Ogunquit, Maine.
 - B. RESIDENT: Resident means a person who has resided in the State of Maine for at least six (6) months next prior to the time his claim of such residence is made, and who has resided in this Municipality for at least three (3) months prior to the time his claim of such residence is made. "Resident" is extended to include nonresident property tax paying owners of real estate in this Municipality.

ARTICLE 31: (Continued)

- C. NONRESIDENT: Nonresident means anyone not qualified as a resident under this Ordinance.
 - D. SHELLFISH, CLAMS: Shellfish and clams means softshell clams ("Mya Arenaria").
 - E. HARVEST: Harvest means to dig, take, remove or otherwise harvest shellfish in the Municipality.
 - F. LOT: Lot means the total number of clams in any bulk pile. Where clams are in a box, barrel or other container, the contents of each box, barrel or other container constitutes a separate lot.
 - G. POSSESS: Possess means harvest, ship, transport, hold, buy and sell retail and wholesale clam shellstock.
5. LICENSING: Municipal Shellfish Digging License is required. It is unlawful for any person to harvest shellfish in this Municipality without having a current license issued by this Municipality as provided by this Ordinance.
- A. TYPE OF LICENSE:
 - 1. RESIDENT SHELLFISH LICENSE: The license is available to residents and entitles the holder to harvest no more than one (1) peck of shellfish in any one day for the use of himself and his family, from the shores, flats or coastal waters of this Municipality, when and where it is lawful to do so. It shall be lawful to harvest clams during the daylight hours only on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Daylight shall be interpreted to mean from one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.
 - 2. NONRESIDENT NONRECIPROCATING SHELLFISH LICENSE: The license is available to any person not a resident of this Municipality and entitles the holder to harvest not more than one (1) peck of shellfish in any one day for the use of himself and his family, from the shores, flats or coastal waters of this Municipality, when and where it is lawful to do so. It shall be lawful to harvest clams during the daylight hours only on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Daylight shall be interpreted to mean from one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.
 - 3. LICENSE MUST BE SIGNED: The licensee must sign his or her license in order to validate it. Any person harvesting clams in this Municipality shall have on his/her person and show to any Warden or Law Enforcement Officer positive identification, when requested, in addition to the license, where required.
 - B. APPLICATION PROCEDURE: Any person may apply to the Town Clerk for the licenses required by this Ordinance on forms provided by the Municipality.
 - 1. Contents of the Application: The application must be in the form of an affidavit and must contain the applicant's name, current address, birth date, height, weight, signature and whatever other information the Municipality may require.
 - 2. Misrepresentation: Any person who gives false information on a license application will cause said license to become invalid and void.
 - 3. Records: The Clerk or designated officials of this Municipality shall note on the application the date the license was issued, sign it and file the application with his or her records.
 - 4. Notice: Notice of the number and the procedure for application shall be published in a trade or industry publication which the Municipal Officers consider effective in reaching persons affected, not less than ten (10) days prior to the period of issuance, and shall be posted in the Municipal Offices until the period concludes.
 - C. FEES: The fee for the license is as stated below and which the applicant shall pay with his application; excepting any person age sixty-five (65) years or more, who upon presenting proof of age to the Clam Warden or designated officials, shall be exempt from any fee requirement.
 - Resident Recreational. \$ 10.00
 - Nonresident Nonreciprocating Recreational. \$ 100.00Fees in excess of \$5.00 for each license are hereby designated to fund conservation measures.

ARTICLE 31: (Continued)

- D. **LIMITATION OF DIGGERS:** Because the shellfish resources are limited and because a digger can be expected to harvest a certain volume of clams per year, the number of licenses must be controlled. The number will vary from year to year depending upon estimates of the resource capabilities and management requirements consistent with good resource utilization. The following procedures will be followed to exercise the control:
1. Prior to October 1 of each year, the Shellfish Conservation Commission, with the approval of the Commissioner of Marine Resources, will establish the number of licenses to be permitted.
 2. The Shellfish Conservation Commission will notify the Town Clerk in writing prior to October 1 of each year the number of licenses to be issued.
 3. The Town Clerk shall issue licenses to residents as allocated for each year on or after November 1; ninety (90) days thereafter licenses shall also be issued on a first-come, first-served basis to nonresidents.
- E. **LICENSE EXPIRATION DATE:** Each license issued under authority of this Ordinance expires at midnight on the 31st day of October next following date of issue.
6. **MINIMUM LEGAL SIZE OF SHELLFISH:** It is unlawful to possess in this Municipality shellfish which are less than two inches (2") in the longest diameter except that a licensee may possess shellfish that are less than two inches (2") if, beginning on the effective date of this Ordinance, same comprise less than 20% of any lot; and beginning in a calendar year 1986, they comprise less than 10% of any lot. The tolerance shall be determined by numerical count of not less than one (1) peck nor more than four (4) pecks taken at random from various parts of the lot or by a count of the entire lot if it contains less than one (1) peck.
7. **OPENING AND CLOSING OF FLATS:** The Municipal Officers, with the approval of the Commissioner of Marine Resources, may open and close areas for shellfish harvest. Upon recommendation of the Shellfish Conservation Commission and concurrence of the Department of Marine Resources Area Biologist that the status of the shellfish resource and other factors bearing on sound management indicate that an area should be opened or closed, the Municipal Officers may call a public hearing on ten (10) days notice published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality stating the time, place and subject matter of the hearing, and shall send a copy of the notice to the Department of Marine Resources. The decision of the Municipal Officers made after the hearing shall be based on findings of fact.
8. **PENALTY:** A person who violates this Ordinance, in any way, shall be punished as provided by 12 M.R.S.A., Sections 6671 and 6681.
9. **EFFECTIVE DATE:** This Ordinance, which has been approved by the Commissioner of Marine Resources, shall become effective, and continue to be effective for a period of not more than three (3) years, after its adoption by the Municipality provided a certified copy of this Ordinance is filed with the Commissioner within twenty (20) days of its adoption.
10. **SEPARABILITY:** If any section, subsection, sentence or part of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decisions shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.
11. **REPEAL:** Any ordinance regulating the harvesting or conservation of shellfish in the Town and any provisions of any other Town ordinance which is inconsistent with this Ordinance is hereby repealed.

- ARTICLE 32: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000) for engineering studies on the Perkins Cove bulkheads and the Perkins Cove drawbridge and to authorize the Selectmen to initiate those studies and to return to the Town at a future date if it is the recommendation of the Selectmen to proceed with repairs and/or modifications to the bulkheads and/or the drawbridge?
- ARTICLE 33: Shall the Town vote to accept a donation of property from Mr. Richard Winkler described as "the portion of lots 77 and 78 as depicted on the Plan of Joshia Chase's Isreal Head property, Ogunquit, Maine dated July 27, 1892, and recorded in the York Registry of Deeds, Planbook 3, Page 33?"
- ARTICLE 34: Shall the Town vote to authorize the municipal officers to use Town equipment on Juniper Lane for fire and police protection as authorized by MRSA 23, Section 3105?
- ARTICLE 35: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500) to pay one-half the cost of materials for the repair of the King's Highway Bridge with the Town of Wells to pay the remaining half of the cost of the materials?
- ARTICLE 36: Shall the Town vote to accept the bequest of Dorothea Jacobs Grant under the terms of her will as executed on April 29, 1976?
- ARTICLE 37: Shall the Town vote to transfer the sum of Ten Thousand, Five Hundred and Fourteen Dollars and two cents (\$10,514.02) from the General Fund to the Revenue Sharing Fund and to use same to reduce the amount to be raised from taxation?
- ARTICLE 38: Shall the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept monies and other donations for the Village Green Project and to authorize expenditures of those monies on the Project in accordance with the provisions of law?
- ARTICLE 39: Shall the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to build a new comfort station in the center of Town on land owned by the Town at a cost not to exceed Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000)?
- ARTICLE 40: Shall the Town vote to adopt the following beach parking pass and fee policy to replace Section 404, Title IV, Public Resources and Conservation Ordinance of the Ogunquit Municipal Code as voted at the Annual Town Meeting of March 3, 1984:
- 404.1 That no motel, hotel or rooming house shall have season passes except those located easterly of the Ogunquit River estuary shall be permitted to purchase season passes for rental units (all or none basis) at Fifty Dollars (\$50) each.
- 404.2 Year-round residents and taxpayers of the Town of Ogunquit may purchase season passes for two (2) vehicles owned by said resident and/or taxpayer; the first pass at Ten Dollars (\$10) and the second pass at Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25). Town employees shall be authorized to place the stickers on the vehicle(s).
- 404.3 Seasonal and monthly renters within the Town of Ogunquit may purchase a pass for one (1) vehicle owned by said renter at Thirty-Five Dollars (\$35). Town employees shall be authorized to place the sticker on the vehicle.
- 404.4 Year-round residents and taxpayers of the abutting coastal towns of Wells and York may purchase one (1) season pass for one (1) vehicle owned by said resident or taxpayer at Thirty-Five Dollars (\$35) which shall be valid at all beach parking lots, except the Main Beach and Lower Lot. Town employees shall be authorized to place the sticker on the vehicle.
- 404.5 Employees of Ogunquit businesses may purchase one (1) parking pass for use at the Obeds Lane Parking Lot only at Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25) with definition and eligibility criteria established by the Board of Selectmen. Town employees shall be authorized to place the sticker on employee vehicles.

ARTICLE 40: (Continued)

- 404.6 Daily rates at all parking lots will be Six Dollars (\$6) daily with the exception of the Obeds Lane lot which will be Three Dollars (\$3) daily, with the Board of Selectmen to have the option to charge a reduced rate of Three Dollars (\$3) until June 22, 1985, and after September 8, 1985, as weather permits and with the Town Manager to have the authority to institute a daily rate of Three Dollars (\$3) during inclement weather.
- 404.7 Children's Camp Bus unloading fee to be Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25) with the additional requirement that they give a minimum of twenty-four (24) hour notice to the Town Manager or Recreation Director so that, for safety precautions, they can be directed to specific beach access points and access times.

Business Bus unloading fee will be Ten Dollars (\$10) per day or Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) per season for Ogunquit businesses and Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day or Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) per season for out-of-town businesses.

ARTICLE 41: Shall the Town vote to carry forward the following balances: \$1,000 from the Ocean Avenue Account, \$4,000 from the Fire Department Repair Account, \$7,500 from the Marginal Way Capital Account, \$600 from the Dunaway Center Account and \$51.08 from the Fireman's Park Account?

ARTICLE 42: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Six Thousand, Three Hundred and Ten Dollars (\$36,310) for General Government Operations? Estimated Budget:

In any event, however, the Selectmen may execute and deliver quit claim deeds at their discretion for the purpose of removing from public record tax liens which have not been discharged through inadvertance?
