

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING
of the
TOWN OF OGUNQUIT

March 28, 1981

TO WILLIAM P. HANCOCK, JR., Chief of Police in the Town of Ogunquit, County of York and State of Maine:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Ogunquit, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet in the Dunaway Community Center in said town on Saturday, the twenty-eighth day of March, 1981, A.D. at eight o'clock in the morning until one o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on Articles 1 through 4; and to notify and warn said voters to meet in the same place in said town on the same day at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon, then and there to act on Articles 5 through 42:

ARTICLE 1: To elect a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.

ARTICLE 2: To elect the following officers for the terms so noted or until such time as a successor is elected and qualified:

- A. Three (3) Selectmen, terms ending Annual Meeting 1983.
- B. One (1) Wells-Ogunquit Community School District Committee member, term ending Annual Meeting 1984.

ARTICLE 3: To vote by secret ballot on the following referendum question:
"Shall the Town of Ogunquit approve the charter recommended by the Charter Commission?"

ARTICLE 4: To vote by secret ballot on the following referendum question:
"Shall the Town of Ogunquit adopt the 1980 Comprehensive Plan Update as recommended by the Planning Board?"

- "That no motel, hotel or rooming house shall have season passes except those located easterly of the Ogunquit River estuary shall be permitted to purchase season passes for rental units (all or none basis) at Fifty Dollars (\$50) each;
- Year-round residents and taxpayers of the Town of Ogunquit may purchase season passes for two vehicles; the first pass at Ten Dollars (\$10) and the second pass at Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25);
- Seasonal renters within the Town of Ogunquit may purchase a season pass for one vehicle at Thirty-Five Dollars (\$35);
- Monthly renters within the Town of Ogunquit may purchase a season pass for one vehicle at Twenty Dollars (\$20);
- Year-round residents and taxpayers of the abutting coastal towns of Wells and York may purchase one season pass for one vehicle at Thirty-Five Dollars (\$35) which shall be valid at all beach parking lots, except the Main Beach;
- Employees of Ogunquit businesses may purchase one parking pass for use at the Lower Parking Lot only at Ten Dollars (\$10), with definition and eligibility criteria established by the Board of Selectmen;
- Daily rates at all beach parking lots at Three Dollars (\$3) except for the Main Beach parking lot which shall be Four Dollars (\$4) daily, with the Town Manager to have authority to institute a daily rate of One Dollar (\$1) during inclement weather;
- Bus unloading fee at Five Dollars (\$5) at all beach parking lots."

ARTICLE 39: To see if the Town will vote to approve the use of all interest earned on all savings and investments funds, excepting trust funds, and any interest received for tax purposes to offset the cost of interest costs for borrowed funds.

ARTICLE 40: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes, such loan or loans to be paid during said municipal year out of money raised during said municipal year by taxes.

NOTE: This is an annual tax anticipation loan request (as approved previously at August 4, 1980 Special Meeting) to allow borrowing until taxes are actually collected and is a common municipal practice.

ARTICLE 41: To see if the Town will vote to fix the date that taxes are due and payable as the date of commitment; and that interest at the rate of 18% per annum be charged thereon forty-five (45) days after date of commitment. ARTICLE 42: To see if the Town will vote to enact an ordinance entitled "Business Registration Ordinance of Ogunquit?"

NOTE: This ordinance would become Chapter 8, page 57 of the Municipal Ordinances adopted June 2, 1980 by Town Meeting vote. The purpose of the ordinance is to provide for public health, safety, and welfare by maintaining a comprehensive list of businesses in Ogunquit for public information. The requirement shall also ensure compliance with other municipal ordinances and regulations. Most other municipalities have several different license requirements for local businesses (i.e. lodging house, innkeeper, victualers licenses). It is recommended that Ogunquit not implement those various licensing methods; one business registration would be required of all businesses on an equal basis. An administrative fee of \$5 is included, with the Board of Selectmen to have the authority to revise that fee, if costs are warranted.
