

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING

OF THE

TOWN OF OGUNQUIT

TO: WILLIAM P. HANCOCK, JR., Chief of Police in the Town of Ogunquit,  
County of York, and State of Maine:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Ogunquit, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet in the Dunaway Community Center in said Town on Saturday, the second day of April, 1988 A.D. at nine o'clock in the morning until six o'clock in the evening to vote by secret ballot on Articles 1 through 5; and to notify and warn said voters to meet in the same place in said Town on Monday, the fourth day of April, 1988 A.D. at seven o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on Articles 6 through 72.

ARTICLE 1: To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2: To elect the following officers for the terms so noted or until such time as a successor is elected and qualified:

- A. Two (2) Selectmen: Each for a two (2) year term to commence at the conclusion of the Annual Town Meeting; term ending Annual Meeting 1990;
- B. One (1) member to the Wells-Ogunquit Community School District. Three (3) year term to commence July, 1988 - ending June, 1991;
- C. Two (2) members to the Budget Committee: Each for a two (2) year term to commence at the conclusion of the Annual Town Meeting; term ending Annual Meeting 1990;
- D. One (1) Trustee to the Kennebunk, Kennebunkport & Wells Water District (KK&WWD) Board of Directors for a three (3) year term ending at the Annual Meeting 1991.

ARTICLE 3: Shall the citizens of the Town of Ogunquit amend Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance Section IX, Paragraph E, Rural Residential District-2-RRD-2 to conform with Section VII, Paragraph E, Residence District-RD for parcels of land with Public Sewer and Water.

THE PURPOSE OF THIS AMENDMENT IS TO ADDRESS THESE PARCELS OF LAND CURRENTLY SERVICED BY PUBLIC UTILITIES IN RRD-2. THEY PRESENTLY ARE NOT BEING ADDRESSED IN SECTION IX, PARAGRAPH E, RRD-2 STANDARDS. THE PROPOSED CHANGE IS TO ADOPT THE STANDARDS OF RESIDENCE DISTRICT-RD PERTAINING TO LAND WITH PUBLIC WATER AND SEWER. BY ADDING TO SECTION IX, PARAGRAPH E, RRD-2 THE STANDARDS OF SECTION VII RESIDENCE DISTRICT-RD PERTAINING TO LAND WITH PUBLIC UTILITIES THE OGUNQUIT ZONING ORDINANCE SECTION IX STANDARDS WILL CONFORM WITH THE REST OF THE TOWN ZONING STANDARDS.

A PETITIONED ARTICLE.

ARTICLE 4: Shall the Town vote to accept the proposed 1987 Comprehensive Plan as recommended by the Comprehensive Plan Advisory Committee, the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen?

ARTICLE 5: Shall the Town vote to adopt the following amendments to the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance, the Ogunquit Building Code and the Ogunquit Planning Board Standards?

1. Chapter I, Section III of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance. The definition of "Dwelling" is revised to read:

Dwelling: A building used, designed to be used or capable of being used for one or more dwelling units including but not limited to single family homes, duplexes, multi-family buildings, apartments, condominiums, studios and efficiencies. Where this Ordinance permits "dwellings", "dwellings" shall mean single family, detached buildings unless the Ordinance provides otherwise. "Dwellings" shall not include trailers.

2. Chapter I, Section III of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance. The definition of "Dwelling Unit" is revised to read:

Dwelling Unit: A room or group of rooms used, designed to be used or capable of being used as a habitable unit for one family with facilities for living, bathing, sleeping, cooking and eating. Motel units or rooms with cooking facilities and hotel units or rooms with cooking facilities shall be considered dwelling units.

3. Chapter 2, Section IV of the Ogunquit Zoning Ordinance is amended by the addition of: B. Dwelling Unit: No dwelling unit of less than 650 square feet of habitable floor space shall be permitted.

4. Chapter I, Section 114 of the Ogunquit Building Code. The definition of "Dwelling" is revised to read:

Dwelling: A building used, designed to be used or capable of being used for one or more dwelling units including but not limited to single family homes, duplexes, multi-family buildings, apartments, condominiums, studios and efficiencies. Where this Ordinance permits "dwellings", "dwellings" shall mean single family, detached buildings unless the Ordinance provides otherwise. "Dwellings" shall not include trailers.

5. Chapter I, Section 114 of the Ogunquit Building Code. The definition of "Dwelling Unit" is revised to read:

Dwelling Unit: A room or group of rooms used, designed to be used or capable of being used as a habitable unit for one family with facilities for living, bathing, sleeping, cooking and eating. Motel units or rooms with cooking facilities and hotel units or rooms with cooking facilities shall be considered dwelling units.

6. A new Chapter 10 is added to the Ogunquit Building Code to read: Chapter 10. Minimum size for Dwelling Units. No dwelling unit shall provide less than 650 square feet of habitable floor space.

7. Article 3 of the Ogunquit Planning Board Standards, Definitions is amended by the addition of: Dwelling: A building used, designed to be used or capable of being used for one or more dwelling units including but not limited to single family homes, duplexes, multi-family buildings, apartments, condominiums, studios and efficiencies. Where this Ordinance permits "dwellings", "dwellings" shall mean single family detached buildings unless the Ordinance provides otherwise. "Dwellings" shall not include trailers.

Dwelling Unit: A room or group of rooms used, designed to be used or capable of being used as a habitable unit for one family with facilities for living, bathing, sleeping, cooking and eating. Motel units or rooms with cooking facilities and hotel units or rooms with cooking facilities shall be considered dwelling units.

ARTICLE 5: (Continued)

8. Article 9 of the Ogunquit Planning Board Standards, General Requirements, is amended by the addition of: 9.13 No dwelling unit shall provide less than 650 square feet of habitable floor space.

ARTICLE 6: Shall the Town vote to carry forward the following balances for use in 1988: Marginal Way Restoration - \$71,158.27; Historical Winn House - \$11,136.93; Fire Department - \$4,000; Sidewalk and Curb Repair Fund - \$16,953.90; Brush/Demolition Dump Engineering Study - \$22,386; Shellfish Conservation Commission - \$2,000; Dunaway Center Handicap Ramp - \$3,000; Street Survey Project - \$20,625?

ARTICLE 7: Shall the Town vote to transfer the sum of Twenty-One Thousand, One Hundred Fifty-Eight and 27/100 Dollars (\$21,158.27) from the Marginal Way Restoration funds just carried forward to the Capital Equipment Fund?

ARTICLE 8: Shall the Town vote to establish a dedicated fund to be called the Marginal Way Beautification Fund to which interested persons may make donations to be used for the beautification of the Marginal Way and from which the Board of Selectmen may expend funds for that purpose with both principal and interest being part of the Fund and with expenditures for beautification to include monuments or plaques to provide suitable recognition for donors to the Fund?

ARTICLE 9: Shall the Town vote to authorize the use of \$4,577 in donations received in 1987 in the name of the late Deborah White as part of the Marginal Way Beautification Fund?

ARTICLE 10: Shall the Town vote to adopt the following amendments to Title II, Chapter 6 of the Ogunquit Municipal Code?  
Chapter 6 of Public Sewer Usage Limitations

6.A.6 Expiration of Permits: Permits issued hereunder shall expire if construction of the development for which each permit is issued has not commenced within ~~six-(6)-months~~ one (1) year of the permit being issued ~~or-if-the-development-is-not-substantially-completed-within-one-(1)-year-of-the-permit-being-issued~~, except that the Board of Appeals may extend the life of such permits if the holder is able to demonstrate that he has been delayed in his development by natural conditions beyond his control or that he has been diligently pursuing other licenses required for the development but has not yet received approval through no fault of his own.

PURPOSE FOR AMENDMENT: (1) BECAUSE MOST COMMERCIAL PERMITS MUST BE REVIEWED BY THE PLANNING BOARD, IT IS, IN MOST CASES, IMPOSSIBLE TO REALIZE ALL APPROVALS, RECEIVE A BUILDING PERMIT AND START CONSTRUCTION WITHIN A SIX (6) MONTH PERIOD.

PURPOSE FOR AMENDMENT: (2) EXTENDING THE STARTING TIME FROM SIX (6) MONTHS TO ONE (1) YEAR WILL MAKE THE ORDINANCE MORE COMPATIBLE WITH THE ZONING ORDINANCE AND STATE LAW.

6.A.10 Expiration of Ordinances: This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment. It shall expire on December 31, 1988-1989 unless the voters after review of adequacy of the Ogunquit Sewer District System, decide to extend this Ordinance to a date certain.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the people of the Town of Ogunquit will vote to amend Chapter 5 of Boats, Mooring Policy. To add a Section to the Mooring List of Priorities entitled Resident Commercial Property Taxpayer. This category to be Number One on the Priority List.  
THIS ARTICLE TO SUPERCEDE THE ORIGINAL ARTICLE THAT WAS SUBMITTED AS BELONGING IN CHAPTER 4. PETITIONED ARTICLE.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the people of the Town of Ogunquit will vote to make it mandatory (sic) when issuing a temporary mooring in Perkins Cove. The Harbormaster must first go to the top of the Priority Mooring List and offer it to the first in line and so on down according to priority on the Mooring List. PETITIONED ARTICLE.

ARTICLE 13: Shall the Town vote to repeal the present Municipal Ordinance known as "Business Registration Ordinance of Ogunquit Title IX, Chapter IX". PETITIONED ARTICLE.

ARTICLE 14: Shall the Town vote that all funds received from the Local Road Assistance Program be used only for the maintenance or improvement of public roads?

ARTICLE 15: Shall the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept donations for the purpose of financing improvements to Ogunquit's Veterans Park and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to expend such funds for the purpose stated?

ARTICLE 16: Shall the Town vote to authorize the use of \$4,208.72 plus accrued interest in funds received from the state under the teacher/administrator block grant to be used to reduce taxation in Ogunquit in 1988.

ARTICLE 17: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,650) and authorize a contribution of \$3,000 of it to York County Health Services and a contribution of \$1,650 of it to York County Counseling Services in 1988?

NOTE: In spite of requests by the Board of Selectmen to do so, these two (2) Agencies did not provide the Town General Assistance Administrator with verification of the residency of those receiving assistance in Ogunquit. Conflicting legal opinions were obtained regarding this issue. The Board of Selectmen voted to send the requests to the voters outside of the regular budget. Four (4) Members of the Board of Selectmen present at the time voted to endorse the requests.

BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS: Yes 4-0

ARTICLE 18: Shall the Town vote to adopt the following Ordinance for Shellfish Management and Harvesting?

1. **AUTHORITY:** This Ordinance is enacted in accordance with 12 MRSA Sections 6671 and 6681.
2. **PURPOSE:** To establish a Shellfish Conservation Program for the Town of Ogunquit which will insure the protection and optimum utilization of shellfish resources within its geographical limits. These goals will be achieved by means which may include:
  - A. Licensing of shellfish harvesters (diggers),
  - B. Limiting the number of shellfish harvesters,
  - C. Restricting the time and area which harvesting is permitted,
  - D. Limiting the minimum size of clams taken, and
  - E. Limiting the amount of clams taken daily by a harvester.
3. **SHELLFISH CONSERVATION COMMISSION:** The Shellfish Conservation Program for the Town of Ogunquit will be administered by the Shellfish Conservation Commission consisting of five (5) regular and two (2) alternate members to be appointed by the Selectmen for terms of three (3) years.

The Commission's responsibilities include:

- A. Establishing annually, in conjunction with the Department of Marine Resources of the State of Maine, the number of shellfish digging licenses to be issued;

ARTICLE 18: (Continued)

- B. Surveying the clam flats to maintain current information on shellfish resources. Such surveys include:
  - a) Determination of size frequency of the shellfish,
  - b) Determination of growth,
  - c) Estimation of the standing crop of shellfish,
  - d) Collection of harvest data documenting local values of shellfish resources,
  - e) Estimation of potential yield of the flats,
  - f) Identification of sources of pollution adjacent to shellfish populations and location of discharges on charts, and
  - g) Identification of other resource problems such as green crab predation on shellfish and competition from mussels.
- C. Submitting to the Board of Selectmen proposals for the expenditures of funds for the purpose of shellfish conservation;
- D. Reviewing this Ordinance periodically and make recommendations for amendments on a timely basis;
- E. Securing and maintaining records of shellfish harvest from the Municipality's managed shellfish areas (and closed areas that are conditionally opened by the Department of Marine Resources);
- F. Recommending conservation closures and openings to the Board of Selectmen in conjunction with the Area Biologist of the Department of Marine Resources
- G. Designing and promulgating a Shellfish Conservation Plan in cooperation with the Department of Marine Resources based on the results of the clam flat survey, incorporating recommended levels of harvesting on the various flats (as shall be delineated on maps prepared by the Conservation Commission). Possible inclusions in such a plan are crop rotation seed programs and predator control;
- H. Submitting an Annual Report to the Municipality and Department of Marine Resources detailing: all funds available, fund expenditures, harvest data, results of all experimental and conservation programs, enforcement activities and sources of pollution.

4. DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED IN THIS ORDINANCE:

- A. MUNICIPALITY: Municipality means the Town of Ogunquit, Maine
- B. RESIDENT: Resident means a person who has resided in the State of Maine for at least six (6) months next prior to the time his claims of such residence is made, and who has resided in this municipality for at least three (3) months prior to the time his claims of such residence is made. "Resident" is extended to include non-resident property tax paying owners of real estate in this municipality.
- C. NON-RESIDENT: Non-resident means anyone not qualified as a resident under this Ordinance.
- D. SHELLFISH/ CLAMS: Shellfish and clams means softshell clams ("Mya Arenaria").
- E. HARVEST: Harvest means to dig, take, remove or otherwise harvest shellfish in the municipality.
- F. LOT: Lot means the total number of clams in any bulk pile. Where clams are in a box, barrel or other container, the contents of each box, barrel or other container constitutes a separate lot.
- G. POSSESS: Possess means harvest, ship, transport, hold, buy and sell retail and wholesale clam shellstock.
- H. PERIOD OF ISSUANCE: Period of issuance shall mean the first ninety (90) days during which this municipality issues shellfish digging licenses each year.

ARTICLE 18: (Continued)

5. LICENSING: Municipal Shellfish Digging License is required. It is unlawful for any person to harvest shellfish in this Municipality without having a current license issued by this Municipality as provided by this Ordinance. It shall be lawful to harvest clams during the daylight hours only on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Daylight shall be interpreted to mean from one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.

A. TYPE OF LICENSE:

- 1. RESIDENT SHELLFISH LICENSE: The license is available to residents and entitles the holder to harvest no more than one (1) peck of shellfish in any one (1) day for the use of himself and his family, from the shores, flats or coastal waters of this Municipality, when and where it is lawful to do so.
- 2. NON-RESIDENT, NON-RECIPROCATING SHELLFISH LICENSE: The license is available to any person not a resident of this Municipality and entitles the holder to harvest not more than one (1) peck of shellfish in any one day for the use of himself and his family, from the shores, flats or coastal waters of this Municipality, when and where it is lawful to do so.
- 3. LICENSE MUST BE SIGNED: The licensee must sign his or her license in order to validate it. Any person harvesting clams in this Municipality shall have on his/her person and show to any Warden or Law Enforcement Officer positive identification, when requested, in addition to the license, where required.

B. APPLICATION PROCEDURE: Any person may apply to the Town Clerk for the license required by this Ordinance on forms provided by the Municipality.

- 1. Contents of the Application: The application must be in the form of an affidavit and must contain the applicant's name, current address, birth date, height, weight, signature and whatever other information the Municipality may require.
- 2. Misrepresentation: Any person who gives false information on a license application will cause said license to become invalid and void.
- 3. Records: The Clerk or designated officials of this Municipality shall note on the application the date the license was issued, sign it and file the application with his or her records.
- 4. Notice: Notice of the number and the procedure for application shall be published in a trade or industry publication which the Municipal Officers consider effective in reaching persons affected; not less than ten (10) days prior to the period of issuance, and shall be posted in the Municipal Offices until the period concludes.

C. FEES: The fee for the license is as stated below and which the applicant shall pay with his application; excepting any person age sixty-five (65) years or more, who upon presenting proof of age to the Clam Warden or designated officials, shall be exempt from any fee requirement

Resident Recreational.....	\$ 10.00
Non-resident, Non-reciprocating Recreational	\$ 100.00

Fees in excess of \$5.00 for each license are hereby designated to fund conservation measures.

D. LIMITATION OF DIGGERS: Because the shellfish resources are limited and because a digger can be expected to harvest a certain volume of clams per year, the number of licenses must be controlled. The number will vary from year to year depending upon estimates of the resource capabilities and management requirements consistent with good resource utilization. The following procedures will be followed to exercise the control:

ARTICLE 18: (Continued)

1. Prior to October 1 of each year, the Shellfish Conservation Commission with the approval of the Commissioner of Marine Resources, will establish the number of licenses to be permitted.
  2. The Shellfish Conservation Commission will notify the Town Clerk, in writing, prior to October 1 of each year the number of licenses to be issued.
  3. During the period of issuance, the Town Clerk shall issue licenses to residents and non-residents as allocated for each year on or after November 1; ninety (90) days thereafter the then remaining unsold licenses shall be issued on a first-come, first-served basis to residents and non-residents alike.
- E. LICENSE EXPIRATION DATE: Each license issued under authority of this Ordinance expires at midnight on the 31st day of October next following date of issue.
6. MINIMUM LEGAL SIZE OF SHELLFISH: It is unlawful to possess in this Municipality shellfish which are less than two inches (2") in the longest diameter except that a licensee may possess shellfish that are less than two inches (2") if they comprise less than ten percent (10%) of any lot. The tolerance shall be determined by numerical count of not less than one (1) peck nor more than four (4) pecks taken at random from various parts of the lot or by a count of the entire lot if it contains less than one (1) peck.
  7. OPENING AND CLOSING OF FLATS: The Municipal Officers, with the approval of the Commissioner of Marine Resources, may open and close areas for shellfish harvest. Upon recommendation of the Shellfish Conservation Commission and concurrence of the Department of Marine Resources Area Biologist that the status of the shellfish resource and other factors bearing on sound management indicate that an area should be opened or closed, the Municipal Officers may call a public hearing on ten (10) days notice published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Municipality stating the time, place and subject matter of the hearing, and shall send a copy of the notice to the Department of Marine Resources. The decision of the Municipal Officers made after the hearing shall be based on findings of fact.
  8. PENALTY: A person who violates this Ordinance, in any way, shall be punished as provided by 12 MRSA, Sections 6671 and 6681.
  9. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance, which has been approved by the Commissioner of Marine Resources, shall become effective and continue to be effective for a period of not more than three (3) years, after its adoption by the Municipality provided a certified copy of this Ordinance is filed with the Commissioner within twenty (20) days of its adoption.
  10. SEPARABILITY: If any section, subsection, sentence or part of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decisions shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.
  11. REPEAL: Any ordinance regulating the harvesting or conservation of shellfish in the Town and any provisions of any other Town Ordinance which is inconsistent with this Ordinance is hereby repealed.

ARTICLE 19: Shall the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to join with other participating municipal and quasi-municipal employers to group self-insure for the provision of worker's compensation benefits, as authorized by 39 MRSA §23, said group to be known as the "Maine Municipal Association Workers' Compensation Fund" (Fund); and for that purpose and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements among participating employers, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a Fund Indemnity Agreement on behalf of the Town and take whatever other actions may be necessary. The authority granted herein shall continue until revoked by the Town?

ARTICLE 20: Shall the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey the Town's right, title and interest to certain undeveloped and unmaintained rights-of-way located between the Frazier Pasture Road and the Marginal Way, further identified on a recent survey conducted by Wright & Pierce as "R/W D", "R/W C" and a right-of-way extending in a general Northerly direction from "R/W C" as it abuts land owned by the Mary E. Burnham Trust; these lands to be conveyed by Quit Claim Deed to the abutting property owners for the total consideration of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000)?

ARTICLE 21: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred and Eighty-Five Dollars (\$6,585) and authorize its expenditure toward the cost of a new brick sidewalk along the Jacobs Block on Shore Road and accept an offer of dedication of that sidewalk to public use from the abutments thereto?

BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS: Yes 4-0

ARTICLE 22: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500) and authorize the expenditure of up to that amount to pay for renovations to the lower level of the Dunaway Center in order to create additional office space?

BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS: Yes 4-0

ARTICLE 23: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500) and authorize the expenditure of up to that amount to hire a consultant to evaluate the Town's needs with regard to the computerization of certain of its functions and to review proposals already received for that computerization?

BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS: Yes 4-0

ARTICLE 24: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) and authorize the expenditure of up to that amount to hire a consultant to identify the long term space needs of the Town and to make recommendations to address those needs?

NOTE: A Space Study Committee was established in 1987 to study the Town's space problems. The Committee recommended the construction of another municipal building to meet the Town's long term needs and the removal of some of the municipal functions to that building. The consultant would determine the necessary space requirements and would design an appropriate structure.

BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS: Yes 4-0

ARTICLE 25: Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) and authorize the expenditure of up to that amount to pay for the purchase and installation of mechanized parking equipment for the Main Beach Parking Lot?

BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS: Yes 4-0

ARTICLE 26: Shall the following vote be adopted:

VOTED: (1) That a capital improvement project consisting of the engineering design of a new bulkhead and preparation of cost estimates for bulkhead and dredging at Perkins cove is hereby approved; and

(2) To fund said capital improvement project a sum not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) is hereby appropriated; and

(3) To meet said appropriation, the Treasurer and Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, acting pursuant to the provisions of 30 MRSA § 5152, are hereby authorized to issue general obligation securities of the Town of Ogunquit (including temporary notes in anticipation of the sale thereof) in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) and the discretion to fix the date(s), maturity(ies), interest rate(s) denomination(s), place(s) of payment,

ARTICLE 26: (Continued)

form and other details of said securities, including execution and delivery of said securities on behalf of the Town of Ogunquit, and to provide for the sale thereof, is hereby delegated to the Treasurer and Chairman of the Board of Selectmen.

BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS: Yes 4-0

ARTICLE 27: Shall the following vote be adopted:

VOTED: (1) That a capital improvement project consisting of the construction of a new Public Works garage and related site improvements on Town owned land adjacent to the Maine Turnpike is hereby approved; and

(2) To fund said capital improvement project a sum not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) is hereby appropriated; and

(3) To meet said appropriation, the Treasurer and the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, acting pursuant to the provisions of 30 MRSA §5152, are hereby authorized to issue general obligation securities of the Town of Ogunquit (including temporary notes in anticipation of the sale thereof) in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) and the discretion to fix the date(s), maturity(ies), interest rate(s) denomination(s), place(s) of payment, form and other details of said securities, including execution and delivery of said securities on behalf of the Town of Ogunquit, and to provide for the sale thereof, is hereby delegated to the Treasurer and Chairman of the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 32: Shall the Town vote to approve the addition of a new Chapter 11 to Title IX of the Ogunquit Municipal Code, which Chapter to be entitled "Special Event Ordinance"? The proposed Ordinance reads as follows:

1101 Title

This chapter shall be known and may be cited as "Special Event Ordinance of Ogunquit".

1102 Purpose

The purpose of this Ordinance is to authorize Special Events on a limited basis, which events serve to promote the Town of Ogunquit and its businesses and to provide for the allowance of outdoor sales in areas where it is otherwise prohibited; and for the temporary use of municipal facilities as provided in this chapter.

1103 Power of Board

The Board of Selectmen may authorize a Special Event which will promote the Town of Ogunquit and its businesses and allow outdoor sales in areas where such sales are prohibited or restricted by special exception in the Town's Zoning Ordinance, and allow the use of municipal facilities provided the Board finds that the event will not have an adverse effect on the safety, health and welfare of the Town and provided further that said event shall not exceed three (3) days, and that no more than four (4) events shall be authorized per calendar year.

1104 Additional Conditions

In authorizing any "Special Event" the Board shall impose such further reasonable restrictions and conditions as are deemed appropriate to best safeguard the public's health, safety and welfare and the right of the citizens to quiet enjoyment of their properties including but not limited to requiring applicants to provide for and pay for an appropriate number of policemen to be present during specified events.

1105 Bond

The Board, at its discretion, may require a bond to be posted by the sponsor of said event, naming the Town of Ogunquit as beneficiary, which can be used to compensate the Town for any damages to town property; for the costs of any police and fire services rendered during said event; or to reimburse the Town for any expenses incurred as a result of a violation of any conditions of the permit issued.

1106 Other Regulations

This Ordinance shall be read in conjunction with all other Ordinances of the Town.

ARTICLE 32 (Continued)

1107 Severability

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not invalidate any other part.

1108 Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately.

ARTICLE 33: Shall the Town vote to adopt the following Beach Parking Pass and Fee Policy to replace Section 404, Title IV, Public Resources and Conservation Ordinance of the Ogunquit Municipal Code as voted at the Annual Town Meeting of April 6, 1987?

404.1 That no motel, hotel or rooming house shall be allowed to purchase daily parking tickets; except those located easterly of the Ogunquit River estuary shall be permitted to purchase daily parking tickets for the Main Beach Parking Lot only on an as-needed basis at a cost of Four Dollars (\$4) per ticket.

404.2 Year-round residents and/or real property taxpayers of the Town of Ogunquit may purchase season passes for two (2) vehicles owned by said resident and/or real property taxpayer or by a member of their household; the first pass at Ten Dollars (\$10) and the second pass at Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25). Household shall include members of the same family who are related by blood or marriage and who share the same dwelling place. Town employees shall be authorized to place the passes on the vehicle(s).

404.3 Seasonal and monthly renters within the Town of Ogunquit may purchase a pass for one (1) vehicle owned by said renter at Fifty Dollars (\$50) upon presentation of verification of their status - which verification must be signed by their landlord or by a representative of the hotel/motel/guesthouse where they are renting. Town employees shall be authorized to place the pass on the vehicle.

404.4 Employees of Ogunquit businesses may purchase one (1) parking pass for use at the Obeds Lane Parking Lot only at Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25) with definition and eligibility criteria to be established by the Board of Selectmen. Town employees shall be authorized to place the pass on the vehicle.

404.5 Daily rates at all parking lots will be Six Dollars (\$6) daily with the exception of the Obeds Lane Parking Lot which will be Three Dollars (\$3) daily; the Board of Selectmen shall have the option to charge a reduced rate of Three Dollars (\$3) until June 18, 1988 and after September 6, 1988, as weather permits, and the Town Manager shall have the authority to institute a reduced daily rate of Three Dollars (\$3) during inclement weather. The Board of Selectmen shall be authorized to institute an hourly charge at the Main Beach Parking Lot in lieu of a flat rate only if a mechanized parking lot control system is installed at the lot.

404.6 The operator of any bus which stops in Ogunquit to discharge or pick up passengers for the purpose of using any of the Town's beaches shall be required to pay a Twenty-Five Dollar (\$25) fee for each trip. In addition, it shall be the responsibility of the operator or owner of any such bus to give a minimum twenty-four (24) hours notice to the Town Manager, Police Chief or Recreation Director so that, for safety reasons, they can be directed to specific beach access points at specific access times. Ogunquit businesses which are affected by this Section may purchase a season pass for Five Hundred Dollars (\$500). Out-of-town businesses which are affected by this Section may purchase a season pass for One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000).

404.7 Beach parking lot passes and tickets shall be sold annually according to a time schedule established by the Board of Selectmen. Each applicant for a beach parking lot pass shall bear the responsibility of satisfying the requirements of this Ordinance. Vehicles registered to a company name or leased must be verifiable for assignment to the applicant before a beach pass may be issued

ARTICLE 33: (Continued)

404.7 to such a vehicle. It is the responsibility of the applicant to provide the verification upon request.

In any event, however, the Selectmen may execute and deliver quitclaim deeds at their discretion for the purpose of removing from public record tax liens which have not been discharged through inadvertance.

The Board of Selectmen hereby give notice that the polls shall be open for voting purposes at nine o'clock in the morning or as soon as possible thereafter of the date of said meeting and that polls will not be closed earlier than six o'clock in the evening of the same day.



A person who is not registered as a voter may not vote in any election. A voter who is not enrolled in a political party may not vote in a primary election.




